Women in History - 30 Years of Famous Firsts

n 2001 a Joint Congressional Resolution proclaimed March Women's History Month. This year's theme was: "Our History is Our Strength – Learning About Women's Tenacity, Courage, and Creativity throughout the Centuries."

The event traces its beginnings back to the first International Women's Day in 1911. The National Women's History Project describes it best: "The stories of women's achievements are integral to the fabric of our history. Learning about women's tenacity, courage, and creativity throughout the centuries is a tremendous source of strength. Until relatively recently, this sphere of women's history was overlooked and undervalued. Women's achievements were often distorted, disdained, and denied. But, knowing women's stories provides essential role models for everyone. And role models are genuinely needed to face the extraordinary changes and unrelenting challenges of the 21st century."

A review of the past 30 years reveals notable Famous Firsts by Women. This list is not exhaustive and there are many other Famous Firsts during this time frame. Consider the list as a starting point to reflect on how far we have come and all that we still have to achieve.

1981 Sandra Day O'Connor is the first woman appointed to the United States Supreme Court.

1983 Dr. Sally Ride becomes the first American woman to be sent into space.

1984 Geraldine Ferraro is the first woman to run for Vice-President on a major party ticket.

1985 Wilma Mankiller becomes the first woman chief of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma.

1990 Dr. Antonia Novello is the first woman and Hispanic to become U.S. Surgeon General.

1991 Sharon Pratt Dixon is sworn in as mayor of Washington, DC becoming the first African-American woman to serve as mayor of a major city.

1992 Carol Moseley-Braun of Illinois becomes the first African-American woman elected to the U.S. Senate.

1993 Janet Reno becomes the first female U.S. Attorney General.

1997 Madeleine Albright is sworn in as U.S. Secretary of State. She is the first woman in this position as well as the highest-ranking woman in the U.S. government.

1998 Mary Mullarkey becomes the first female Chief Justice of the Colorado Supreme Court.

1999 Lt. Col. Eileen Collins is the first woman astronaut to command a space shuttle mission.

2005 Condoleezza Rice becomes the first African-American female Secretary of State.

2004 Elizabeth Starrs becomes the first Colorado woman to be inducted into the prestigious International Academy of Trial Lawyers.

2006 Effa Manley, co-owner of the Negro Leagues team Newark Eagles, becomes the first woman elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

2006 Karen Mathis becomes the first President of the American Bar Association from Colorado.

2007 Nancy Pelosi becomes the first woman speaker of the House of Representatives.

2008 Hillary Clinton becomes the first woman in U.S. history to win a presidential primary contest.

2010 Monica Marquez is sworn in as the first female Hispanic Colorado Supreme Court Justice and she is also the first openly gay jurist on the state's high court.
